
How Did People Celebrate the First VE Day?

Many people waited outside Buckingham Palace to see the King.



How Did People Celebrate the First VE Day?


- People gathered in the streets. They hung bunting and banners.
- Everyone made food to share with each other at street parties. They sang songs, danced and waved flags.
- People even wore red, white and blue which are the colours of the British flag.
- The capital city became very busy on VE day. Anyone who could get to London did so. They watched parades and celebrated together. Crowds of people filled Trafalgar Square. Others waited outside Buckingham Palace to see the King appear.



- Some people believe that Princess Elizabeth and Princess Margaret even slipped out of Buckingham Palace to join in with the celebrations in London.
- At 3 o'clock, people listened to the Prime Minister on the wireless. Winston Churchill said, "My dear friends, this is your hour. It's a victory of the great British nation."
- Church bells rang across the entire country to share the good news.
- People also set off fireworks and lit bonfires.

Did You Know...?

The war may have been over in Europe but it continued in other parts of the world for a number of months until September 1945.
